20 years of TREE (Transitions from Education to Employment): Exploring life courses in their making

On the occasion of TREE's (Transitions from Education to Employment) 20th anniversary and its extension to a multi-cohort survey, the Swiss Journal of Sociology plans for a special issue focussing on analyses drawing on (youth and young adult) panel data. Contributions should take into account the multi-dimensionality, the intersectionality and the societal embeddedness of various life course stages and transitions. The special issue particularly aims at addressing the following topical foci:

- Medium- and long-term effects of earlier transitions on subsequent educational and labour market pathways, especially with respect to the evolution und cumulation of multiple social inequalities (cumulative [dis-]advantages);
- Interdependencies and spill-over effects between various life domains (education, work, family, health, social integration, self);
- Impact of institutional opportunity structures on individual outcomes of (formal) education and labour market outcomes;
- Historical, cross-national or cross-regional comparisons;
- Impacts of the Corona pandemic;
- Methodological issues with regard to (multi-cohort) panel data.

Given the occasion of the special issue, contributions drawing on TREE data are particularly welcome.

Indicative timeline:

- 15 October 2021: Deadline for abstracts
- 15 March 2022: Submission of the full paper to journal
- July 2023: Publication of the special issue 49(2)

Your submission for the special issue should include the following:

- name, email address, and affiliations of all the authors
- title of the paper
- abstract of around 500 words, structured as follows: topic, aim, methods, results, discussion, conclusion.

The guest editors will decide on the acceptance or rejection of the abstract until **31 October 2021**.

Selected authors will be invited to submit their manuscript (max. 8,000 words, 50,000 characters including tables, figures and references) by **15 March 2022**. The manuscripts will go through the usual peer-review process of the Swiss Journal of Sociology. Accepted languages are English, German or French. Publication is planned for **July 2023**.
